Conversation with a Stranger

Most of us have probably had the experience of striking up conversations with strangers – perhaps we start chatting when we're waiting in a supermarket queue; or perhaps we start talking to the person next to us on a long train journey.



The Gospel of Luke tells us the story of two people on a journey from

Jerusalem to Emmaus; they met a 'stranger' along the way who struck up a conversation with them. The two on the road – Cleopas and his companion – were in a state of bewilderment and uncertainty, mixed with shock and sadness because of the crucifixion of Jesus. Perhaps they felt there was nothing more they could do, so they decided to go home. But the walk to Emmaus was going to be a journey that those two disciples would never forget. The 'stranger' is of course the risen Jesus, but the two on the road didn't recognise him until much later on.

The two travellers told this stranger about their shattered hopes, and he listened and let them talk. Like those two disciples, almost all of us have to face the experience of shattered hopes; some of us have to face shattered hopes on several occasions in our lifetime. It might be a broken relationship; a lost job; a serious illness which limits what we're able to do; a failed ambition, or a lost loved one.

But, like the two disciples, we can tell God just how we feel and share with him our feelings of disappointment, hurt and anger - and then open ourselves up to receive his response. He is willing to listen to us as we pray. He chooses his own time to reveal himself and sometimes he meets with us in unexpected ways or teaches us important things through unusual situations. Often God is right there, at work in our particular situation, even if we don't recognise his work at the time.

When the travellers arrived at Emmaus they invited their new friend to stay with them; he broke bread with them at the table and "their eyes are opened" – they recognised Jesus.

What a day it must have been for those followers of Jesus! First the despair they had felt since the day he was crucified; then the puzzlement about the empty tomb; then the sheer joy of meeting the risen Lord himself.

The followers of Jesus learned that God can turn around a seemingly hopeless situation; and he can do so for us as well. That doesn't mean we won't have to face problems and difficulties. But Jesus can meet with us in the darkest situations and transform the way we face them.




The first thing to get clear is that it's nothing to do with borrowing! 'Lent' is a shortened version of the old English word 'lencten' which means 'Spring season' so doesn't really have much to do with Christian belief - simply 'the time of year leading up to Easter'.


So what's Lent really all about? Traditionally Christians have 'given up' things during Lent - chocolate is probably the favourite! In church we give up singing the Gloria, we don't have flowers, and the colour is dark purple. All these are signs of sorrow that Jesus had to die, so on Good Friday we remember the death of Jesus so our sins can be forgiven and on Easter Sunday we remember Jesus rose from the dead. So Lent is the forty days leading up to all that happening.

All this might help with self-discipline - or it could make people think Lent is a time of morbid sorrow - which is shouldn't be. These days we try to make Lent a time when we reflect more deeply on what we believe and how we live. One of the things we do is to give up a couple of hours of T.V or another pastime each week to explore just that in something called 'Lent Courses'. These cover many different things in many different ways, but usually will be informal

and relaxed, will start and end with a time of quiet and prayer, and will include much discussion and sharing of thought and ideas. The people who come will have a variety of viewpoints to contribute, and will be at many different stages of belief, sometimes with more doubt than belief!



The Lent Course at St. Paul's is a five-session Bible study guide - "Confidence in a Complex World" with a blend of real-life practicality, biblical scholarship, and a whole-life discipleship focus. The sessions will happen from 19:45 on Wednesdays 4th, 1th, 18th, 25th March, and 1st April in church and all are welcome, whatever your belief or not! The themes will be: Confident in the Gospel', Confident in Identity, Confident in The World, Confident in Relationships, Confident in Witness and Confident in the Community.



In his letter to scattered groups of

Christians in what is modern-day Turkey, the apostle Peter ignites imagination and inspires hope for the possibilities of everyday life in a complex world. This Course aims to help you to discover Peter's trove of wisdom for everyday living. This is a letter that is both exhilarating in its scope and intensely grounded in the grittiness of real life. Like those who first received Peter's letter you will be challenged to see your daily context afresh and deeply encouraged to live confidently – Monday to Sunday – wherever you are. In each session there will be time for personal reflection and for group discussion – all viewpoints and backgrounds will be valued.

We need your help


At the moment we have no toilets in the church building the nearest are at the bottom of the churchyard in the church hall. This is very inconvenient for baptisms, weddings, funerals, our other church Services and social activities beneficial to the local community. So we're planning to have two toilet cubicles, one fully

accessible for mobility impaired users, installed in church at a cost of around £80,000 - costing this much largely because the church building hasn't got a sewer pipe outlet and the nearest connection for one to be laid is at the church hall.
